- Confidential 24-hour emergency domestic shelter for women and women with children feeling and needing immediate safety from danger
- Shelter provides basic living needs including food with the Transitions Program helping women find a more permanent home, employment, and referrals to other services, which include legal help, counseling, support groups, services for young children, employment programs, health-related services, educational opportunities, and financial assistance

 **World Wide Opportunities on Organic Farms (WWOOF), Housing Exchange Program (✉ admin@woofhawaii.org) (www.woofhawaii.org)**

- WWOOFers volunteer and have a chance to farm with many different individuals in various settings from rugged farm settings in a tent to a private cottage or house

 - Initial test is free; re-testing fee is a flat rate of \$25 (cash or check) regardless of how many sections you choose to retake

 - ◆ Health Occupations / Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA)
